Are You Thinking About Lent?

Lent will be here before we know it. I thought it would be a good time to talk about what Lent is, so that we can all better prepare for it.

What is Lent?

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism.

Lent lasts for 40 days and it begins the day following Shrove Tuesday, (also known as Fat Tuesday) on Ash Wednesday. There are actually 46 days in between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday, but Sundays during Lent are not considered "prescribed" days of fasting or sacrifice.

What is Ash Wednesday?

"The distribution of ashes reminds us of our own mortality and calls us to repentance.

The ashes that we receive are a reminder of our sinfulness, and many people that receive them will leave them on their foreheads all day as a sign of humility.

Why do we give up things for Lent?

Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or volunteering and giving of themselves for others. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan."

It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. This is when most people ask themselves "What should I give up for Lent?"

Lent is such a great time to better ourselves and spread love, goodness and kindness to others. Lent can be more than just "not eating chocolate" or "giving up soda".

Lent is a time for service to others, reducing waste, sacrificing things that we sometimes overindulge in.

Lent is a time to think about those 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness. Lent is a time that we remember the sacrifice that Jesus made for us, giving his life so that we should live.

As you plan for Lent, be sure to stay focused on your relationship with God. Pray about what you should give up or what project God may be calling you to. Try to make it to Ash Wednesday-being part of Ash Wednesday service is a great start to this very holy time in our churches calendar.








Isaiah
Psalm 138
1 Corinthians 15:1-11
Luke 5:1-11

SCRIPTURE OVERVIEW: The theme of calling is continued in this week's readings. Isaiah has a vision of God on the throne and is terrified because he knows that he is unworthy; yet he is being called by God. The psalmist, traditionally David, praises God for having a purpose for his life and bring it to completion. Paul echoes Isaiah's sentiments of his own unworthiness to the Corinthians. While assuring his readers of the reality of Christ's bodily resurrection, Paul recognizes that he preaches only by the grace of God. When Jesus is calling his disciples, Simon Peter recognizes him as the Lord and cowers because he feels unworthy - much like the prophet Isaiah had done. These readings teach us that God's call is based not on our worthiness but on our willingness.

Trust the Paradox
FEBRUARY 7–13, 2022
BRANDAN ROBERTSON
Jeremiah 17:5-10
Psalm 1
1 Corinthians 15:12-20
Luke 6:17-26

scripture overview: God wants us to be rooted firmly in our faith. Jeremiah contrasts those who put their trust in themselves with those who trust in God. The latter are like healthy trees with deep roots and a constant water supply, never in danger of drying up or dying. The psalmist uses the same image to describe those who meditate on God's teachings. Thus, as you do these daily readings and reflect on them, you are sinking deep roots into fertile soil. Agricultural imagery is continued in Paul's letter. Paul describes Jesus Christ risen in the flesh as the first fruit, meaning that he is the first of many who will be resurrected. In Luke's version of the Beatitudes, worldly success is not necessarily an indication of God's blessing.

SCRIPTURE OVERVIEW: Joseph had experienced betrayal by his brothers and then had been sold into slavery. At the time, he no doubt felt abandoned by God. However, after God raises up Joseph in Egypt, Joseph is able to provide for his family in a time of drought. Although others have acted with evil intentions, God uses those actions for good. The psalmist offers a similar encouragement. We struggle in the real challenges that face us, but we believe in a God who can carry us through them. In First Corinthians, Paul explains that God carries us even through death to resurrection glory on the other side. Jesus teaches us to respond to evil with mercy. Because we believe in a God who will ultimately bring justice, we do not need to serve as judge and executioner.

Tending to the Souls of Our Youth

Why is it so important for us to have strong, effective, and healthy ministries that focus on our children and our youth?

We have much to think about if we truly want to build our children and youth ministries.

I know sometimes we think...."kids don't really need that much attention". Why should we focus so many resources on kids? We should focus on other things. Kids come with their parents anyway....right?

I know it's easy to think this way, but the reality is that a church without children is terminally ill. Children really are the future.

When a family comes into our churches the most important thing to them is what do they have for our children? Will our children like it here? The needs of the parents are important as well, but what will keep these families coming back is how we love their children...how we educate their children...how we interact with their children.

Building programming for children is not just about keeping families coming. It is biblical. It's our job to build a church where our children are learning and growing. Here's what the Bible tells us:

- #1 Jesus has promised that you will not lose your reward when you serve children. "And if you give even a cup of cold water to one of the least of my followers, you will surely be rewarded." Matthew 10:42
- #2 Children's ministry matters to Jesus. "But Jesus said, "Let the children come to me. Don't stop them! For the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to those who are like these children." Matthew 19:14
- #3 The majority of people who come to Christ, do so when they are children. "If anyone causes one of these little ones-those who BELIEVE in me to stumble, it would be better for them if a large millstone were hung around their neck and they were thrown into the sea." Mark 9:42
- #4 Jesus will bless the church that makes children's ministry a top priority. "Anyone who welcomes a little child like this on my behalf welcomes me, and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not only me but also my Father who sent me." Mark 9:37
- #5 When you reach a child, they can serve Jesus for a lifetime. "You have been taught the holy Scriptures from childhood, and they have given you the wisdom to receive the salvation that comes by trusting in Christ Jesus." 2 Timothy 3:15
- #6 Children are a gift from God. "Children are a heritage from the LORD, offspring a reward from Him." Psalm 127:3
- #7 Children need our guidance. "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old, he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6
- #8 We are commanded to bring up children in the ways of the Lord. "Do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord." Ephesians 6:4

We have got to remember - Jesus loves the little children. All the children of the world. Red and yellow, black, and white, they are precious in His site...Jesus loves the little children of the world.

When we love and teach our children it is as if we are traveling forward through time. Our voices, our message, the word of God will be shared and heard long after we are gone. Children will continue to live and spread the message of hope that we have shared with them.

Children are the greatest mission field. Each one of them is so important. We need to give them the attention that they deserve. We need to offer excellent programming no matter if we have one child or 100 in our classrooms.

The greatest thing, the most important thing that we can do is tend to the souls of children.
