Working in God's Field

We plant a big garden at my house each year. Much bigger than we probably need, but we enjoy it each year. Jim, Sara and I love the garden and work it together.

Near the end of the winter we spend a lot of time talking about what we will grow in the spring. What type of plants we will put in. What the layout of the garden will be. We decide if a particular vegetable will be started from seed or if we will buy plants to put in. We start putting seeds in soil and putting them in the greenhouse. We pay attention to the weather, we make sure they stay warm enough, cool enough, enough ventilation.

We like the challenge of growing a garden. We like the satisfaction of watching the plants grow and produce.

We have a responsibility to care for the plants and to support the growth of the garden, but ultimately God is in charge. He is in charge of the rain, of the sunshine, the wind....he is in charge of the overall success of our garden.

1 Corinthians 3:6-8 "I planted the seed, Apollos watered the plants, but God made you grow. It's not the one who plants or the one who waters who is at the center of this process but God, who makes things grow. Planting and watering are menial servant jobs at minimum wages. What makes them worth doing is the God we are serving. You happen to be God's field in which we are working."

Paul cannot call the Corinthian Christians "spiritual" people. Though they are in Christ, they continue to live to the flesh. They are young in Christ, spiritual toddlers...Divisions among them prove they are still serving themselves, picking sides in a senseless debate. Paul insists that both he and Apollos are mere servants of the Lord and co-workers. They are not in competition. I think he uses the agricultural metaphor because much like my garden at home he and Apollo, as men of God, have a responsibility to support the growth of these toddlers....just like a new plant....they are expected to help them grow.

We all have a responsibility in God's garden. We may be the planter, we may be the tiller, we may be the one who cleans the weeds. No one's responsibility is more important than the others. We just all need to do the job that has been assigned to us. We must care for God's Garden together.



Parable	Meaning	Significance for today
A man went out to sow grain.	The man represents God and the seed is His message.	Just as a planted seed starts to grow, the word o God starts to deepen and grow within a person.
Some seed fell on the path and the birds ate it.	The birds represent Satan. The seed on the path represents people who hear the message, but it is immediately lost.	There are people who don't live a good Christian life because they are focused on other things.
Some seed fell on rocky ground where there was little soil. The seed soon sprouted, but when the sun came up it burnt the young plants.	The seed on the rocky ground represents people who respond with initial enthusiasm, but the word of God does not sink in deep. When persecution or hard times (represented by the sun) come along they give up at once.	People cannot commit to the Christian lifestyle. They are initially attracted but give up when the going gets tough.
Some seed fell among thorn bushes which grew up and choked the plants.	The thorn bushes choke the message of God. It is heard, but people's concern for riches and their worries about life cause the plants to die.	Some people are too concerned with what others think and they worry too much. They may be jealous, angry or concerned with materialism.
Some seed fell on good soil and the plants produced corn.	Good soil represents people who hear the message and live it in their lives.	Some people have strong faith and remain dedicated to a Christian lifestyle, even when thing are difficult.

What Is Christian Testimony? How Do I Tell My Own Testimony Story?

"NO, GO BACK TO YOUR FAMILY, AND TELL THEM EVERYTHING GOD HAS DONE FOR YOU." SO HE WENT ALL THROUGH THE TOWN PROCLAIMING THE GREAT THINGS JESUS HAD DONE FOR HIM.

Luke 8:39 NLT

During their journey to a saving relationship with Jesus, many people find the most compelling stories about Him, and reasons for having faith, come from the Christians they already know. If you're looking for proof of Jesus, ask your peers about their journey with Christ.

What they tell you is their own Christian testimony: The story of their coming to, or walking alongside of, Jesus.

A Christian testimony can be about a person's journey to becoming a Christian—also known as a conversion story—or it can be a way in which God has shown up in a person's life. Perhaps it is a lesson God has taught them or a reminder He gave. Sometimes it's an answered prayer or a victory over sin. Sometimes it's a way in which God provided extraordinarily in a tough situation. Can you look back on something in your own life and recognize how God played a part? These are all types of Christian testimony.

Testimonies come in all shapes and sizes! Some are very dramatic, with wild turning points and big "Ah-ha! I get it!" moments; some are far less so and have a slow build, but they are no less compelling. Some testimonies may involve great struggle and the story of how God helped the person through it. Some may involve different incidents that make far more sense after reflecting on them. You may not realize something is a testimony until much later, but when you think back, you can see the hand of God working in your life.

You'll find testimonies from others to be fascinating, hope-filled, and a great way to get to know God and the power of faith.

Your personal testimony is wildly compelling and is the most powerful tool you have to demonstrate the love of Jesus and how he has changed you.
